Christmas has a large and colorful cast of characters: The three principals, the Angel Gabriel, the Inn keeper, the Shepherds, the Heavenly Host. We know about the birth of Christ in all its detail. The Manger is as familiar as our own home. We have made a major production of it......

WITH EASTER IT IS ENTIRELY DIFFERENT.

The Gospels are far from clear as to just what happened. It began in the dark. The stone had been rolled to one side. Mary Magdalene seems to have gotten there before anyone else. Did Jesus appear at the tomb or only later? What did He say? What did He do?

The Easter Story is not a major production at all. The minor attractions we have created around it, the bunnies, the baskets, the dyed eggs, have so little to do with what it's all about that they neither add much nor subtract much. It's not really much of a story when you come right down to it. It doesn't have the ring of great drama. What it has is the ring of truth!

If the Gospel writers had wanted to tell it in a way to convince the world that Jesus indeed rose from the dead, they would have done so with all the skill and fanfare they could muster. Here, there is no skill, no fanfare. They seem to be telling it simply the way it was.

To be sure, something unimaginable happened! HE ROSE FROM THE DEAD.

A few people saw him briefly and spoke with him. That is the essence of the Easter Story. If it is true, there is nothing left to say. If it is not true, there is nothing left to say. For believers and unbelievers both, life has never been the same again. For some, neither has death (been the same again).

Because of the day of Resurrection, human existence has greater depths of beauty, joy, and benediction than even the wildest visionary has ever dared to dream.....

SEARCH COMMITTEE REPORT TO THE CONGREGATION

March 22, 2017

I would like to take a moment to update the congregation on the status of our search process for the Rector of St. Peter's Episcopal Church.

The Search Committee had a dinner meeting and orientation session with Joann Saylors, Canon for Deployment and Congregational Development, on January 19th. Spouses were in attendance for the first part of the meeting and were informed as what to expect for their spouse's time commitment, and the need to maintain candidate's privacy at all times.

We then had a series of meetings where we first reviewed the Parish Profile in depth to be sure we had a good understanding of it and to answer any questions or concerns we might have as we discuss this with potential candidates. From this review and a review of the Search Process Guide we were given, we began to develop questions we would ask candidates during an interview process. This took multiple meetings and a lot of correspondence to develop and refine relevant questions.

On March 9th, Joann met with us again at which time she presented us with a list of names of potential Rector Candidates. The list contained 15 names, from seven different Diocese, and four different states including Texas. It is a very diverse list of candidates which we feel meets the Vestry's desire for an expanded search, not limited to the Diocese of West Texas.

Our next step was to send out a letter from me, representing the Search Committee and St. Peter's Parish to ask each candidate if they would be interested in being a part of our search. These letters were sent on Monday, March13th, with a date of April 5th for necessary reply. Considering the significant life change this decision means to a Candidate and their family, we do not expect an immediate response from each person on the list.

As of now we are scheduled to meet on April 5th. At that time, we will review the responses, make decisions on how to determine which candidates best fit our Parish Profile and therefore will need to be scheduled for a visit and interview from Search Committee Members. We will most likely make these visits in groups of three committee members. From these visits, we develop a list of finalists, and eventually the candidate we will recommend to the Vestry for consideration to be the next Rector of St. Peter's.

As you can see, the search for the new Rector of St. Peter's is in full swing and at a point where we need your prayers more than ever. We ask that every member of our congregation pray for discernment not only for those of us on the committee but also for all those on the list of potential candidates. If that happens, we are assured that God will lead us one and all to a successful conclusion of this process.

Love Not Nails

It is the reality of God in this world, an action. The Passion of Jesus Christ is the Love of Jesus Christ. It was not the nails that held him to the cross but His Love that held him. This Love has an object, or recipients. *These recipients are you and me.* It was his *Love* for you and me that held him to the cross. The Passion of Jesus Christ is *Love* and it is for *you!*

I pray that this Easter Season is full of Passion, Passion for Him as His Passion is YOU!

FEBRUARY VESTRY REPORT

The vestry met on February 27, 2017. The idea for a "Noisy Offering" was discussed. Barbara announced the "Abide in Me" conference to be held at TMI on June 3, with workshops on several topics, followed by the investiture of Bishop David Reed as Bishop of the Diocese of West Texas. All are encouraged to attend the conference and/or the investiture ceremony. Junior Warden Lee Underwood discussed a roof leak in the roof of the breezeway between the office and Tucker Hall. A roofing company was contacted to offer an estimate. Our dumpster will be emptied twice weekly instead of three times which will save \$1900 per year. Chrisie Jennings reported that January was a good month financially with giving and expenses being on target. Lee suggested we resume recycling through scrap solutions, details to be worked out. A cleanup day was announced for March 25. Deborah Rommel and Megan Russ will join Rich Schneider and Patrick O'Fiel on the joint Vestry/School Board committee. Barbara announced the hiring of a music director/organist. She announced that March 12, would be David Miron's first Sunday at St. Peter's. Megan Russ reported on the parents' meeting for children's Sunday school and announced a special Lenten series to be taught by parent volunteers.

MARCH VESTRY REPORT

The vestry met on March 20, 2017. We had a visit from Search Committee chairman Mickey Horany. Mickey reported that 15 names of potential candidates were given to the committee by the Diocese. Letters were mailed to the 15 people on the list with an April 5, deadline for a response indicating their interest in moving forward in the search process. We are hoping that the committee will have a name to present to the vestry by mid-June. Megan Russ reported that Sunday School is going well with around 30 children in attendance. It was reported that our first "Noisy Offering" raised \$265.47 which will be donated to buy hay for ranchers affected by the wild fires in the Texas Panhandle. Lee reminded us of the cleaning day on March 25.

A SPECIAL OFFERING COMING ON GOOD FRIDAY, APRIL 14th

Some years ago I had the opportunity to write meditations on "THE SEVEN LAST WORDS FROM THE CROSS" as experienced, from the perspective of LONGINUS, ROMAN CENTURION,

The Commanding Officer of the execution squad that first Good Friday

Our service will begin at noon on Good Friday and conclude at 3:00 p.m.,

corresponding with the time our Lord was on the Cross. There will be Meditations on the Seven Last Words, followed by prayer, silence, organ, and hymns. Each "segment" throughout the three hours is some twenty five minutes (you are free to come and go during these periods of silence), but, I urge you, if possible, to arrange your schedule allowing you to remain for the entire service. As it was for Longinus, it just might be a life changing experience for you.

Longinus begins: "My men and I were assigned to the execution detail on that particular Friday. Crucifixion was nothing new, we did it all the time.....but, this one, this prisoner, was different. I could sense it from the very moment we were summoned to take him away to Golgotha and crucify him.....

Longinus concludes: "There are decisions to be made at the Cross that determine character and destiny – there is no evasion possible. Evasion itself is a moral decision, though a negative one........







Lorraine is writing a book about a young girl's painful but extraordinary journey through abandonment to triumph. At one of her lowest points she discovers a force greater than herself and makes a secret covenant connection that will become the bedrock for the rest of her life. Providing her with a renewed resilience that only eagles dare, she searches for answers that may never come. Daily facing unbelievable odds, she realizes there is a bigger plan in the making far beyond her wildest dreams
