Much has changed since the beginning of the school year. Our children are taller, smarter, and even more vocal.


If you have ever joined us for St. Peter's School Chapel, you know what I mean. It is a joy to hear our children sing their songs in chapel. They sing with such confidence and joy! Over the course of one academic year, we know these children have developed in mind, body, and spirit, and you can hear it in their voices.

A few months ago, we introduced a chapel song to the children: This Is The Day That The Lord Has Made. This particular song is an "echo" song which means that one half of the students in chapel sing a line and then the second half of students echo by singing the same line. Well, our children are quick learners, and before we knew it, we could hear the beautiful exchange of young and happy hearts. This might be one metric of the children's spiritual development.

This year, we have learned amazing stories from the Jesus Storybook Bible. We have learned The Lord's Prayer. We have prayed for our family members and those in need. We have learned wonderful songs that we know by heart.

Springtime and Easter invite us to receive the message of new life, and we can see it and hear it in our children. Their spirits blossom and rekindle in us the meaning of this time of year. We can see signs of this new life with the wildflowers in bloom, and Easter brings the message of new life and a new day.



do not bring a sick child to school. Children must be "fever free" for **24 hours** in order to return to school.



What early childhood research tells us about how young children learn . . .

What you will find in our NAEYC classrooms

As adults, we are concerned with the outcomes or the product of our efforts. We want the report to look nice, the cookies to taste great, or the hedges to be perfectly straight. We participate in few activities just for the fun of doing them.

In part this is because we are not still learning how to do most of these activities. But do you remember when you learned how to play tennis or golf? Or use a new computer program? In the beginning you needed to do a certain amount of "messing around" - exploring what would happen if you did this or that.

That is the way it is with your child. Kids are learning new things all the time, and they need the freedom to try things out without worrying about the product.

Luckily, young children tend to be more involved with the process or the doing than they are with the end product or results. That is why your child may draw all afternoon yet still not be able to tell you what they drew. And why one child can pour rice back and forth between pitchers all day long, and another will string and unstring beads every day for a week.

It is hard for us adults to look beyond the product of an activity and see what the child is learning from the process. Perhaps they're learning coordination or beginning writing skills or making discoveries about triangles or gravity. They are certainly finding out that doing for one's self is very satisfying — and that builds confidence.


Be patient. Allow your child the time to grow and learn through the various processes that are part of the task. Enjoy watching his or her involvement. Later, we all can be proud of the product.
